


SSHA 2024 Annual Meeting Social Science History Association President's Welcome

Welcome to the 2024 Annual Meeting of the Social Science History Association, held in Toronto, Canada. This year's conference is the 49th conference of SSHA since our conference was first held in 1976.

Meeting at the Westin Harbour Castle Hotel in Toronto's harbourfront, our conference is taking place on the traditional territory of many nations including the Mississaugas of the Credit, the Anishnabeg, the Chippewa, the Haudenosaunee and the Wendat peoples.

Our theme this year, "Trust and Distrust of Historical Sources in the Digital Age", speaks to scholars across the twenty SSHA networks. With the reliability of historical sources and their role in defining identity, kinship and community belonging in the spotlight more than ever, we ask how our critical approach to historical sources has evolved in the digital age. Our gathering this year creates the opportunity to address this important question by drawing upon the particular strengths of our organization: our multi-disciplinary and internationally comparative approach to research, which encourages the engagement of junior and senior colleagues as well as efforts to "think outside the box".

This past year, SSHA has experienced several important transitions. In December 2023, Jeff Beemer, our Executive Director and managing editor of our journal, Social Science History, resigned from both positions. Jeff had been with the journal since 2005 and had served as our ED since 2022. We are extremely grateful to Jeff for his long record of service to the journal and association. In July 2024, we welcomed our new Executive Director, Jeremy Land. A Ph.D. graduate of George State University, Jeremy brings extensive experience in conference organization from business and economic history conferences. Jeremy took immediate charge of our conference organization, and we owe him a tremendous debt of gratitude for taking the conference reins so ably. In July, our journal transitioned to a new editorial team led by Simone Wegge as Editor-in-Chief, and including Associate Editors Martin Dribe, Robert Lieberman and Silvia Pedraza. We express our sincere thanks to outgoing co-editors Kris Inwood and Rebecca Emigh for their dedicated and innovative work on Social Science History during their terms of service. Finally, we are pleased to welcome the new network, Critical Studies, which, in its first year, has already organized a large number of sessions and roundtables. Those interested to learn about this new network will have the opportunity to do so at a roundtable discussion Thursday morning and at their network meeting on Friday.

We are grateful this year to our Programme Committee, Sakari Saaritsa, Shari Eli and Matt Nelson as well as all our network chairs, who have worked tirelessly to create a dynamic programme with sessions spanning 20 different networks. We thank Emily

In the course of 2024, SSHA has received several donations from members; we are grateful for these contributions which have been used to support our student travel awards. We express a special thanks to the Munk School of Global Affairs and Public Policy, the Centre for the Study of the United States at the Munk School and The People's History Lab at the Munk School for helping fund our conference. In the coming year, we look forward to launching a new fundraising campaign to mark SSHA's half-century.

I hope the everyone will take advantage of the multiple opportunities to meet and participate in this conference beyond the planned sessions. The Social Science History Association is an interdisciplinary group of scholars that shares interests in social life and theory; historiography, and historical and social-scientific methodologies. SSHA might be best seen as a coalition of distinctive scholarly communities. Our substantive intellectual work ranges from everyday life in the medieval world – and sometimes earlier – to contemporary global politics, but we are united in our historicized approach to understanding human events, explaining social processes, and developing innovative theory.

The term "social science history" has meant different things to different academic generations. In the 1970s, when the SSHA's first meetings were held, the founding generation of scholars took it to reflect their concern to address pressing questions by combining social-science method and new forms of historical evidence. Quantitative approaches were especially favored by the association's historical demographers, as well as some of the economic, social and women's historians of the time. By the 1980s and 1990s, other waves of scholars - including culturally-oriented historians and anthropologists, geographers, political theorists, and comparative-historical social scientists - had joined the conversation.

New intellectual directions continue to emerge at the outset of the 21st century. Today's SSHA incorporates a diversity of scholarly styles, with lots of crosstalk among them. When you become a member of SSHA, you will receive the association's journal *Social Science History*, which comes out quarterly in both print and online formats. Members have access to the journal's full online content, which includes all recent issues as well as past issues available from the journal's online archives. Along with your 12-month subscription to Social Science History, members also receive a reduced conference registration rate, are entitled to vote for officers and committee members, and encouraged to participate in the Annual Business Meeting.







The Baltic Connections 2025 will take place at the University of Helsinki, Finland, from May 21-23. It is hosted by the University of Helsinki, the Faculty of Social Sciences, and the Unit of Economic and Social History. As with the earlier conferences, we aim to bring together scholars working on comparative, economic, social, global, and other types of history and related social sciences to address various "East-West" historical processes and events as well as comparative and transnational analysis, including at the Baltic region, Europe, and the world. Potential topics include but are not limited to trade, migration, comparative development, international political economy and the diffusion and transplantation of institutions, ideas and cultural influences. We hope to promote interdisciplinary encounters and discussions, with the goal of bringing together scholars working in Western, Nordic, Central and East European, Baltic, and other universities. We are open to proposals that incorporate new digital technologies and ideas for roundtables. This year's conference will also be a formal pre-conference host for the 2025 World Economic History Congress to be held in Lund, Sweden. Complexity and its Consequences

"History is indeed little more than the register of crimes, follies, and misfortunes of mankind" or so wrote Edward Gibbon some two centuries ago. Over time we have come to interpret this tendency less as the result of individual errors and more as a result of large-scale historical processes that depend on emergent and structural forces outside of the direct control of any one individual. Previous eras may have thought of these effects through the lens of tragedy, fate, or paradox. In the present, we might consider at least some subset as the result of the complexity of social organization.

Complexity makes exact predictions difficult, but progress has been made in understanding and identifying, and even analyzing and modeling emergent phenomenon, interdependence in systems, network properties, feedback loops, multiple chains of causation, and dynamic processes. How can we put complexity science and its tools to work to improve our understanding of historical processes, unintended consequences, cultural evolution, social coordination, and social change?

The 2025 Program Committee welcomes individual papers and panels on all aspects of social science history. It is especially interested in papers and panels that apply concepts and tools for studying complex processes to history. Topics of particular interest include the following:

- Can we distinguish between contingency and emergence in history? Has our understanding of the balance between structure and agency changed?
- Have the limits to historical explanation changed over time with the introduction of new methods of analysis, new concepts, and new data sources?
- What are the limitations of new tools of analysis, such as AI?
- How can AI tools be used to build new more detailed and site-specific computational models of historical change?
- How can we use new AI tools to harvest more systematic and relational data from the historical record, such as translating early modern type into text readable formats?
- How can we better understand the role of social networks in social change?
- Can the historical record be better leveraged to build insight into resolving social coordination problems?
- Can history help us understand aggregation and scaling up problems and other hard to predict social outcomes that result from complexity and interdependence?
- What are the methods that hold the most promise for the capturing the complexity of history?

85th Annual Meeting of the Economic History Association *Information and Communications in Economic History* Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, September 5-7, 2025

Information and Communications in Economic History is the theme of the 2025 meeting. The theme is inspired in part by Allan Pred's classic work on the *Urban Growth and the Circulation of Information* and by the location of the meetings in Philadelphia, headquarters and key hub of the first postal system in the United States. "Spreading the news" helped encourage the creation and diffusion of new technologies, stimulated market integration and population flows, and fostered the dissemination of new social values and norms. But information flows and their control also re-enforced systems of oppression. Economic historians, moreover, are familiar with how the structure and content of information was generated in the past conditions and constrains what we can learn today. The surviving quantitative data and qualitative evidence are selected, with possible biases; and they are structured in ways reflecting past concerns and capabilities. Research exploring how information flows and communication systems of the past impact our current understanding also fits within the conference theme, as does work engaging with and reflecting on the ongoing information explosion in economic history.

The Program Committee, chaired by Hoyt Bleakley (University of Michigan), welcomes submissions on **all** subjects in economic history, though some preference will be given to papers that fit the theme of the conference. Papers should be submitted individually, but authors may suggest to the Committee that three particular papers fit well together in a panel. Papers should in all cases be works in progress rather than accepted or published work. Submitters should let the program committee know at the time of application if the paper they are proposing has already been submitted for publication. Individuals who presented or co-authored a paper given at the 2024 meeting are not eligible for inclusion in the 2025 program. To submit a paper, use the following URL: https://eh.net/2025-eha-meeting-proposal-2/. Paper proposals must include a 1,000-word proposal with a 150-word abstract suitable for publication in the *Journal of Economic History*. Paper URLs can be provided within the form above, but no attachments will be allowed. **Paper proposals should be submitted by January 31, 2025**, to ensure consideration. *Please note that at least one of the authors must be an active member of the EHA*. If you have difficulty with the form, please reach out to Jeremy Land at jeremy.land@helsinki.fi.

Graduate students are encouraged to attend the meeting. A poster session welcomes work from dissertations in progress. The poster submission system will open on February 1, 2025. Applications for the poster session are due no later than April 15, 2025, online on the meetings website. The dissertation session, convened by Joshua Hausman (University of Michigan) and Leigh Gardner (London School of Economics), will honor six dissertations completed during the 2024-2025 academic year. The submission deadline is May 31, 2025. The Allan Nevins and Alexander Gerschenkron prizes will be awarded to the best dissertations on North American and non-North American topics respectively. To be eligible for the prizes, you must be a current EHA member at the time of submission. Dissertations should be submitted via the form at the following URL: https://eh.net/2025-dissertation-submission-form/. The form will also ask for 150-word abstract to be used for the program, if chosen as a finalist. For files above 10MB, the application form will include a space for a URL or link to download the full dissertation. All submissions will be acknowledged by return email.
